also known as the festival of love. Maria organised colourful painting activities to mark the occasion, including T shirt art.










#### Space theme

Carmen noticed that the children were interested in **space** and followed this up with activities involving the moon, stars and planets. She set up a range of play opportunities involving sensory activities with moon sand, as well as small world play.

Hanna picked up on this theme and introduced the children to the **Man on the moon** book which all the boys and girls enjoyed listening to. We often heard the children talking about Bob and aliens.























#### **Mother's Day**

An incredibly well attended **Mother's Day tea** took place on Monday 20<sup>th</sup> March, attended by most Day Nursery mummies and some grandmothers. Sharon put on a feast of egg sandwiches, scones and more. We all had

such a good time we forgot to take any photos! Thank you for all the wonderful feedback; we have our thinking caps on about how to host a similar event for Father's Day in June.

#### **STEM activities**

We enjoyed a visit from Big ACE children and staff to undertake some joint **STEM** (Science Technology Engineering Maths) activities. See the Nursery School section below for further details. Inspired by these activities, we set up our own **rainbow science** experiment. Bably

and Carmen involved all the girls and boys in this activity. We put different food colouring on the tuff spot then added some baking soda followed by vinegar. The end result was amazing: all of the colours changed to a foam texture and expanded.







#### **Outings**

We've been out and about. Each **trip** is a valuable learning experience with both the destination, as well as the journey to and fro, providing lots of opportunities for counting (e.g. car wheels) spotting numbers (e.g. on front doors) road safety (crossing roads and looking at road signs) learning the names of flowers and plants, enjoying a drink and a

snack in a new location, handling money and much more.

We visited the chicks at Big ACE (more about that below) and walked to the Central Library. We're regular visitors to the library and plan to visit every other month. We also enjoyed an outing to the local supermarket.


Thank you for going to so much effort on World Book Day; we very much enjoyed all


the books you sent in as well as the costumes the children arrived in.





















#### **The Chicks**

Eight out of ten of the embryo eggs hatched and we enjoyed looking after the chicks for the rest of the fortnight. We learnt to stand with our hands behind our backs when looking at the chicks and most parents came in to see our fluffy visitors. We talked about life cycles, as well as learning vocabulary like pipping (the cracking of the egg shell in the

early stages of hatching) and dander (the feathers are covered in it when they hatch, giving them a wet appearance). The project provides valuable lessons in how to be quiet, kind, gentle and caring towards others in addition to inspiring art activities: some lovely paintings and clay models of chicks were made.

#### International Women's Day: 8<sup>th</sup> March 2023

We celebrated the day with a group of girls, staff and mothers running a lap of Parker's Piece, cheered on by a supportive group from the art room windows!





#### Visit to the Day Nursery for STEM activities

We enjoyed visiting our younger friends at the Day Nursery for some STEM activities. It was a "happy smells" session to tie in with British Science Week, the main theme of which was *connections*. Children were encouraged to smell a series of hidden items and guess what they were: they had a really good guess at items like lemongrass, mint, coffee beans, potato and jelly.





#### Connections theme - British Science Week

Bethany has been liaising with Julia on the Parents' Committee (Rebecca's mummy) to set up closer connections with local organisations. The first one we've linked up with is Jimmy's on East Road, a charity that provides both support and housing to homeless people. The children made Spring cards for the twenty residents and delivered them in person.



#### Parent visitors – Antarctica talk

We've been fortunate to have a whole host of interesting visitors in the last few weeks:

In tune with the connections theme for British Science Week, Andrew (Oscar R's daddy) came to talk to us about his work as a scientist, which sometimes takes him to the **Antarctic.** He told as about krill and the food chain that is important to sustain the larger animals which inhabit the Antarctic e.g. penguins, orcas and elephant seals. As well as showing us photos from his expeditions, Andrew brought in some warm weather

clothing and goggles for the children to try on. He suggested that the girls and boys huddle together like Penguins in the Antarctic and a couple of children subsequently reported that they felt warm in a closely packed group.

The session inspired one child to watch a David Attenborough programme about elephant seals whilst another brought in a photo of his toy orca to show friends at nursery.







#### Parent visitors continued – patterns theme

We had a patterns theme earlier on in this half-term (spotting patterns on animals and making our own) so we were delighted when two parents came in to share their crochet and patchwork hobbies with us. There were lots of patterns to discover in their handicrafts.

Thank you to Hanna (Clara's mummy) for sharing her patchwork quilts with us. The children enjoyed making their own patterns out of different fabrics cut into hexagonals. Thanks also to Alison (Oscar R's mummy) who brought in various crocheted objects she had crafted.







#### Parent visitor – music session

Thank you to Regev, Yotam's daddy, for leading a music session that involved both piano and flute. The children were fascinated by the sound of the flute up close.





#### Parent visitors continued - Easter talk

Jon, Clara's daddy, came in to talk to us about Easter. He told us that it is the biggest celebration of the year in church. Jon showed us the candle that is lit on Easter Sunday which the children were surprised to find was almost as tall as them. Jon also let us look at some of the gold themed decorations that are used at this time of year. Thank you, Jon!



#### Parent visitors continued – author/illustrator

Chloë, Oona's mummy, came in for an author/illustrator storytelling session. With her help, the children created their own character, Pinky Slinky. For the rest of the day the girls and boys were coming up with their own characters. Thank you for a fun session, Chloë.



#### Parent led outing to Makespace

Thank you to Andi, Max's daddy, for organising a trip to Makespace, a community workshop in town.

We saw a whole host of tools and machines including 3D printers and laser cutters. Andi engraved the letters 'ACE' onto a piece of wood using one of the laser cutters, and showed us a number of models that had been made with the printer. We've been invited back for a second trip next term!





#### Parent visit to make Challah

Atira, Shaya's mummy, came in to make Challah with the children. It is a special bread, usually braided, typically eaten on the Jewish Sabbath and festivals. It's a sweet bread containing vanilla. We enjoyed measuring out the ingredients, mixing them together, kneading the dough and then braiding it.

We had enough dough to make a second batch the following day with a different group of children. We were all offered a taste of the Challah when it was still warm — it literally melted in the mouth. Thank you, Atira.





#### **Growing activities**

With Spring in the air, we've started our growing activities. We made pots out of newspaper, filled them with compost and then planted various seeds. The tomatoes have already germinated. We're looking forward to getting going in the allotment during the playscheme next week and to using our new planters (which were pictured in the last newsletter).





#### **Spring Fayre**

The Spring Fayre took place on Saturday 25<sup>th</sup> March and was a huge team effort, with about 40-parents coming together to make it happen. Huge thanks to everyone who attended or volunteered their time. The event was expertly run by Ariana, Luca O's mummy — thank you! Thanks also to Vicky, Iris's mummy, for leading the clean-up operation. Just under £100 was raised for the ACE Bursary Fund from the tombola, so thank you to everyone for supporting this particular initiative.

### **Staff News**



This month we feature **Gemma**, Deputy Headteacher at the Nursery School, who has been at ACE for nearly 20 years and is about to go on maternity leave. We interviewed her as she embarks on an exciting new phase of her life.

When did you start at ACE?

I started working at ACE in September 2003 and this September will be 20 years.

Have you changed roles since you've been at ACE?

Yes, I have changed roles a couple of times. I began my time at ACE as a newly qualified Early Years Practitioner. After several years of gaining more experience, I then moved up to Third in Charge and more recently stepped up again to Deputy Headteacher.

What are the main changes have you seen at ACE over the years?

The amount of paperwork has definitely changed. I started at ACE when there was really very little in terms of paperwork. Then the Early Years Framework changed and suddenly we were drowning in paperwork, making the job twice as difficult and more importantly taking us away from the children. Finally

in 2021 the framework was changed again and it was emphasised that practitioners should not be spending large amounts of time away from the children. Finally, some sense from the government, although it's a shame it took such a long time!.

The other main change was during and after the pandemic. We had for many years worked in a certain way in terms of the routine and staff deployment. This then had to be adapted and it took some time to adjust to a different way of doing things but we have worked hard as team to make this work and have taken positives from the changes.

What particular memories stand out from your [19?] years at ACE (good and bad!)? Gosh that's a question so many memories from my time at ACE. So, here's just a few...

I have taken children on trips many times over the years but one trip to Wimpole was particularly memorable. It was all going well and we started to walk back from the folly when the most awful thunderstorm was suddenly surrounding us. I just remember lots of crying, being completely drenched and relief when we made it back to the coaches.

Another memory is when some colleagues and I had taken a group of children to the Parkside School gym for the morning. We had such a great time, joining in with the children on the large mats and apparatus. We returned in a joyous mood; however, when the yellow door opened, we were greeted with those dreaded words "OFSTED is here!" These were the days when OFSTED just showed up without notice for an inspection. The joyous gym morning then became a distant memory, but we were pleased we had missed some of the OFSTED visit!

We have had some great visitors too: Professor Robert Winston came to film for the 'Child of our time' series and a parent came in with his Olympic gold medal for rowing, which we got to hold.

Finally, I have to say that the staff Christmas parties will always hold great memories. We held a couple in the basement of ACE and the karaoke was always a highlight (I think my other colleagues would agree my singing voice is excellent!)



### **Staff News**

What have you most enjoyed about working at ACE? I think the fact that every day is different and you never know what each day will bring. Also, how much the children develop over their time with us. Every summer as children depart for school, looking at them and thinking they are ready to go gives you so much joy from the job you have done.

I also have to say I have most enjoyed working with fantastic colleagues. I started out newly qualified at ACE, so had so much to learn, but I can honestly say I learnt from the best.

Have you stayed in touch with former ACE colleagues who have left?

Yes, I have stayed in touch with quite a few former colleagues. For many years a former colleague and I went travelling to different countries when we had time off; she comes to visit me most years and I have been to see her in Berlin where she now lives. I have met up with other colleagues for coffee or lunch and we text each other from time to time to see how each other is getting on in life.

What are your top tips for looking after young children? You should be in a great position to look after your own child after all this experience at ACE!

I think patience is definitely a top tip - you need a lot of it and just take a deep breath and count to 10 if all else fails!

Are there any particular rhymes or stories you are looking forward to sharing with your baby?

I think my baby will be hearing so many rhymes as I have built up quite the back catalogue over the years. I love sharing books with children "We're Going on a Bear Hunt" is a favourite and has memories for me as it was the book I read to a group of children when I came for my interview at ACE.

Do you know if you are having a boy or a girl?

No I don't. It's been quite a journey to get here so a healthy baby is all I am hoping for.

How has your pregnancy been so far? Have you had any cravings?

The pregnancy has definitely had ups and downs so far but hopefully a smooth last few months. Not many cravings actually - just really in the early days of cheese and onion crisps.

When are you going on maternity leave? What are you most looking forward to during your maternity leave/about having a baby?

I go on maternity leave after the Easter holidays. I'm most looking forward to becoming a mum for the first time and I have to say I will not miss the commute into Cambridge every day.

We're delighted that **Diana** has agreed to step up to acting Deputy Headteacher at ACE Nursery School whilst Gemma is on maternity leave.
